This Public Seminar is designed to bring together expert views of professionals, public policy and practice leaders on the contemporary aspects of the home and housing design in contemporary Britain and Europe. Chaired by Mr. Bryan Sanderson (CBE), the Home Renaissance Foundation Chairman and driven by two Keynote addresses by Professor Sir Harry Burns, Professor of Global Public Health at Strathclyde University, former Chief Medical Officer for Scotland, and Professor Antonio Argandoña, Book Editor & Chair of Corporate Social Responsibility at IESE Business School, University of Navarra, The Seminar will host a roundtable panel of architects to debate the notion, values and ethos of the home as a social institution and its implications on the design of contemporary housing and domestic architecture in the UK and Europe.

Book: "The Home: Multidisciplinary Reflections".

In the first major work to take the home as a centre of analysis for global social problems, experts from a variety of fields reveal the multidimensional reality of the home and its role in societies worldwide. This unique book serves as a basis for action by proposing global legislative, political and institutional initiatives with the home in mind. The multidisciplinary and integrative approach taken by this book avoids simplistic accounts of the home, studies the value of the home, the service it offers, and its contribution to the wellbeing and prosperity of communities. Reviewing its internal functions and external relationships, the authors connect the themes of family, housing, income and wealth, community, relationships, family policies, socioeconomic setting, culture and history from across the

world. Academics studying issues such as family, housing, public and social policy, sociology, urban studies and poverty will benefit from the range of insights this book offers into what the home means worldwide. Policymakers, social organizations and specialized networks working in the areas of family, education, poverty and housing will greatly benefit from the insight and breadth of this research.

Speaker Profiles



Bryan Sanderson

Before becoming Chairman and Founding Director of Home Renaissance Foundation and Chairman of Florence Nightingale Foundation, Sanderson was Managing Director of BP, Chairman of BUPA and Standard Chartered Bank. He also helped establish the Learning and Skills Council as its first Chairman. He served as Vice Chairman of the Court of Governors at LSE and is a Trustee of the Economist Group. After gaining a BSc in Economics at LSE and furthering his education in the IMEDE Business School Lausanne, the majority of Sanderson's business life has been in the management of advances made in areas ranging from technology to corporate law, from financial regulation to societal and cultural behaviours.



Harry Burns

Sir Harry Burns is Professor of Global Public Health at Strathclyde University and was previously Chief Medical Officer for Scotland. He graduated in Medicine at the University of Glasgow and went on to become Consultant Surgeon at the Royal Infirmary in Glasgow. Working with patients in the east end of the city gave him an insight into the complex inter-relationships between social and economic status and illness. In 2011, he received a Knighthood in the Queen's Birthday Honours and in 2014 was awarded a lifetime achievement award by the Scottish Government and the Scottish Parliament for Public Service. He has recently been made Honorary Fellow of the Royal Incorporation of Architects of Scotland.



Antonio Argandoña

Antonio Argandoña holds a PhD in Economics from the University of Barcelona. He is Emeritus Professor of Economics and of Business Ethics and holds the "la Caixa" Chair of Corporate Social Responsibility and Corporate Governance at IESE Business School, University of Navarra. He is a member of the Royal Academy of Economics and Finance of Spain, President of the Standing Committee on Professional Ethics of the Economists' Association of Catalonia and a member of the Commission on Anti-Corruption of the International Chamber of Commerce (Paris). He has published numerous books, book chapters and articles in prestigious journals on economics and business ethics. He has been editor of books and journals, member of ethics committees of business associations and financial institutions, and has held government positions at IESE Business School and with numerous scientific and professional bodies.



Tricia Akers

Tricia Akers is one of the two owner/directors at Allan Joyce Architects (AJA) in Nottingham. Her role involves designing and managing construction projects primarily in the Education and Housing Sectors. Tricia joined AJA after completing her post graduate studies at the University of Nottingham and has been working as an examiner on their part 3 course for a number of years. Her professional interests include environmentally sustainable design and she has just led a joint research project with University of Nottingham. The study compared energy-modelling at design stage with actual energy usage in a selection of completed residential properties. It also analysed the variables that cause the performance gaps in use and will be used to inform and enhance future design work.



Julie Richards

Julie Richards studied at the Architectural Association, School of Architecture in London during the period 1993 – 2005. She worked as an Architectural Assistant at the Office of Zaha Hadid during the year between her Part I and II studies in 1997. Upon graduating from the AA in 2000, Julie engaged in private work which led to her founding her own practice, Julie Richards Architectural Design Ltd. in 2002. She also founded Escapade Retreats Ltd. in 2010, a proposed collection of 10 historic houses regenerated as luxury exclusive-use destinations for the discerning traveller. Julie was a Lecturer in Architecture at the University of Nottingham's School of the Built Environment for a period of 10 years, 2003 – 2013. She taught as a Third Year Design Tutor, a Third Year Unit Head and finally as a Fourth Year Design Tutor. Since relocating to Nottinghamshire, Julie has become involved with NDSA (The Nottingham & Derby Society of Architects) a branch of the RIBA East Midlands, aiming to promote architecture through events and activities.



Mohamed Gamal Abdelmonem

Professor Gamal Abdelmonem is Chair in Architecture and the Director of the Centre for Architecture, Urbanism and Global Heritage (CAUGH) at Nottingham Trent University. Gamal has led design studios and architecture history & theory subjects at Queen's University Belfast, Nottingham Trent University and the University of Sheffield with over 20 years of experience in architectural practice & education. He is a Fellow of the Royal Society of Arts and the 2014 recipient of the Jeffrey Cook Award of the International Association for the Study of Traditional Environments (IASTE). His recent books include 'Peripheries: Edge Conditions in Architecture' (Routledge 2012), "The Architecture of Home in Cairo" (Routledge, 2016), and the forthcoming "Architecture, Space and Memory of Resurrection in Northern Ireland" (Routledge 2019).
